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






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


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From the homely to the grand – above: Vernacular ticket office at Dufftown, and below, Keith Town






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
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More whisky galore

THE LEGACY of the Highland classic Whisky Galore is soon to be revived as a remake of the 1949 original hits the cinema screens this

In the original film, based upon the reallife sinking of the **SS Politician** off the Isle of Eriskay during the Second World War, the dour and staid Captain Waggett is outwitted at every Portsoy, Loch Long and even The Renton, stage by the smart islanders of Todday, who try near Dumbarton. everything to get their hands on the precious cargo of uisge-beatha...'the water of life'... as rare as gold-dust during wartime rationing.

A Scottish classic, the original had epic performances from Basil Rathbone and Gordon Jackson and even boats some Gaelic language, making it a firm favourite with both Gael and non-Gael alike. Iain Mclean, producer of the new film, a

crofter's son from Lewis, spent more than ten years completing his dream project, which did have its quota of 'nightmare moments.'

The new cut has an all star cast of Eddie Izzard and Gregor Fisher amongst others, and enjoys the added bonus of the skills of writer Peter McDougall and director Gillies MacKinnon.

A fluent Gaelic speaker himself, Mclean, now based in Glasgow, said one of the hardest things was raising the finance: they got no grants or government subsidies to make the film, all the finance had to be raised privately

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RECENT YEARS have seen boom conditions in the whisky trade and as a reflection of this there has been a move to re-open some distilleries that had been closed and more ambitiously to build brand new purpose built distilleries.

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The elegant design of the new complex has

been recognised in a number of architectural awards for the French owners, the Pernod-Ricard drinks giant which, through the long established Chivas Brothers, owns many distilleries in the area.

Many local companies were involved in the £25m contract for the plant which has a capacity of

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EDINBURGH'S International Festival of music and drama may be preparing to celebrate its seventieth birthday this year, but whisky too is being celebrated in festive fashion on an ever increasing scale throughout Scotland – and indeed the world.

Without doubt the biggest event – and the one which gets the season off to a flying start – is the Spirit of Speyside Whisky Festival, held this year from April 28 to May 2.

This year there is a huge range of events and while many of these are booked long in advance, there is still plenty going on in whisky country.

Events range from guided tours (you can be chauffeur driven in a Range Rover), advanced tastings, study sessions, whisky awards, music, even a pop-up shop. Two of the area's castles – Gordon Castle in Fochabers and Drummuir Castle are getting in on the act, with Gordon Castle offering afternoon tea in the walled garden, accompanied by 'whisky cask cider.' There is even the opportunity to paddle your own canoe on the Spey!

Many of the planned events have proved so popular that they have long been sold out, but a visit to the festival website – www.spiritofspeyside.com will reveal others that

still have space and the festive atmosphere on the streets of Dufftown has to be experienced.

It is worth looking out for an autumn whisky festival, planned for later in the year.

Other whisky related celebrations follow thick and fast across Scotland throughout the season.

Also at the start of May, (on May 7), the Albert Hall in Stirling is the setting for the The Spirit of Stirling Whisky Festival. Amongst the attractions promised are a couple of master classes. Details from www.spiritofstirlingwhiskyfestival.co.uk.

At the end of May – from May 20 to the 28th – the action switches to the Island of Islay. Started in 1986, the Islay Malt and Music festival has gone from strength to strength. The festival takes in the distilleries – Lagavulin, Bruichladdich, Caol Ila, Laphroaig, Bowmore, Jura Distillery Open Day, Kilchoman Distillery, Bunnahabhain, Ardbeg - to name but a lot. In the Lake District there is the Lakes Distillery on the shores of Bassenthwaite, offering a shop and guided tours and in London the London Distillery Company is offering tours around its 'Cold Room' for £15 (prebooking essential).

Meantime the Scotch Malt Whisky Society say their 'ambassadors' will bring their whole whisky 'kit and kaboodle' to any venue of your choosing.
